

Dean Explains How to Make a Speech Heard

Speaker Owes Careful Articulation, Ample Volume to Hearers.

"We are continually engaged in an atmosphere of sound," were the opening words of Dean Carl F. Eyring's address on "What Factors Determine Whether a Speech Is Heard," given in assembly Wednesday.

Dr. Eyring reviewed last summer from a three year leave of absence factors which he experienced in the Bell laboratories in New York.

"The first factor that determines whether speech sounds will be heard is articulation," Dr. Eyring declared. "The speaker must endeavor to enunciate sounds clearly, especially the consonants."

The second factor, perhaps the most important, is the volume of the voice. Articulation falls off very rapidly with speech power.

"The third factor is things to avoid: an audience; first to articulate clearly, second, to make sure that the audience hears him," Dr. Eyring continued.

The first criterion is the third factor. Dr. Eyring outlined the evolution of the modern auditorium from the meeting place by the ancient of speaking from a tower.

An important difficulty arising from speaking within walls is reverberation. He named the ladies gym as an example of a room with excessive reverberation.

As a closing effect, he conducted an articulation test to determine the effect of sound absorption in the College Hall. Physics students located the speaker in the room aided with the experiment.

Dr. Marshall aided by playing illustrations records from the Bell laboratories. Invocation was offered by Professor C. S. Boyle and a song by the mixed chorus completed the program.

He was born March 23, 1862 in Richwood, England. He came to Utah when a boy and lived in the vicinity of Springville. He studied law at the University of Michigan, Columbia, and George Washington University.

Sutherland married Rosamond Lee of Beaver on June 18, 1883 and started to live in Salt Lake in the same year. He became a member of the first Utah State senate in 1886. From 1901 on he was a member of the 57th Congress and a member of the United States senate from 1905-1917. He is also the author of many associate justice of the United States Supreme court by President Taft. He is also the author of a book "Constitutional Power and World Affairs" (1919).
