> Adjournment and Re-Convening of the Louisiana Legislature—The Anderson Casc.

Washington special says the adjournment of the Louisiana Legislature, tonight, without action on Anderson's case, disappoints at least two members of the Cabinet who had positive assurances from New Orleans that Anderson would be pardoned. Some think the State Supreme Court will order his release, which prospect provented Nicholls from interposing, and thereby rendering himself unpopular.

NEW ORLEANS, March 7 .- Governor Nicholls has convened the Legislature in extra session for 15 days. specifying the matters for consideration, including the revenue and appropriation bills. The extra session will cost the State about \$75,000.

Use to be made of the First Silver Dollars Coined-Silver Certificates, Etc.

WASHINGTON, March 7.--After full consideration and consultation with the members of both Houses of Congress, the Secretary of the Treasury has determined that the first silver dollars to be issued will be used in exchange at par for gold coin or for the purchase of silver bullion at the market price. He does not feel at liberty to use them to pay current expenses until the amount coined is sufficient to furnish all alike without discrimination; therefore, they will at present be used for the purchase of silver bullion at market rates. Silver certificates will soon be ready for issue and are in the form of bank notes engraved in the best manner and printed on bank note fibre paper.

The Yellowstone Park.

Washington, March 7.—The Secretary of the Interior to-day sent to the House a communication recommending an appropriation of \$150,000 to be expended in carrying out the intention of the act of March, 1872, relative to setting apart a tract of land near the Yellowstone River as a public park, under the control of the Secretary of the Interior, who shall make such remuneration as he may deem proper for the preservation of all timber, mineral deposits, natural curiosities and wonders within the park and their retention in their natural con-

The Four Per Cent. Loan.

WASHINGTON, March 7 .- The Secretary of the Treasury will, until further notice, receive subscriptions for the four per cent. funded loan of the United States at par and accrued interests. Forms of application will be furnished by the Treasurer at Washington and the Assistant Treasurers at Baltimore, Boston, Chicago, Cincinnati, New Orleans, New York, Philadelphia, St. Louis and San Francisco. and by national banks and bankers

Bennett's Polar Expedition. WASHINGTON, March 7 .- The Senate Committee on Commerce to-cay agreed to report a bill complying with James Gordon Bennett's request that the Pandora be allowed to sail under an American flag, and that naval officers be detailed in the proposed Arctic expedition.

The Eight Hour Law.

Washington, March 7.—The House Committee on Education and Labor to-day agreed to report favorably a ioint resolution, restricting the eight hour law, and providing that the same be recognized as a day's labor throughout the Government service, Virginia's Financial Matters.

RICHMOND, March 8. - Governor Holliday sent to the Legislature today a communication, setting forth in the strongest terms, his sentiment that the State debt should be paid without the suggested Constitutional Convention or other expensive methods.

Trouble With King Blambert's Cabinet, ROME, March, 7 .- Signor Crispis' resignation probably presages the Cabinet's fall. King Humbert will probably commission Signors Cairoli and Zanardeli to form a new Ministry. A coalition of the Government is impossible, as the Left refuses any compromise. Minister Cappino, of Public Instruction, and Peres, of the Public Works, have resigned as well as Signor Crispis. Signor Depretiz, the Premier, will still have a working majority, and it is supposed that he CHICAGO, March 7 .- A Tribune's will attempt to form another Cabinet, but he can hardly succeed.

> Ronmania on Meundary Lines-Austria's Vote of Credit - More Moundaries.

LONDON, March 8 .- A correspondent at Vienna hears, on trustworthy authority, that Roumania will only cede Bessarabia if the Powers consent, but will refuse to receive the Dobrudscha under any circumstances.

A strong opposition to the vote of credit is still manifest in the delegations. Some believe the renunciation of the annexation scheme will be necessary. It is reported that the Austrian Cabinet has come to a final decision as to the form of demand for credit to be submitted to the delegations on Saturday.

The conditions of the treaty between Turkey and Cussia provide that Montenegro wi nelude Gatchko, and that the so western boundary of that country wall be the River Bogana. Servia will include Nisch and Little Zaronik.

France on Enlish and Egyptian Interesis.

LONDON, March 7.—A Paris correspondent says it seems certain that France will readily consent to England's obtaining complete security in regard to the Suez Canal, but would do her utmost to dissuade England from occupying Egypt. France desires joint action with England respecting Egypt. Prince Bismarck recently stated that he would himself propose at the congress the English occupation of Egypt, Germany guaranteeing the non-intervention of

Papal Troubles and Policies. London, March 8 .- A dispatch from Rome states that the Swiss Guards of the Vatican on Wednesnay demanded their month's pay, usual on the death of a Pope. On refusal, they loaded their muskets and brandished their halberds, but were quieted by conces-

The Pope and Cardinal Franchi have determined on a policy of reconciling, as far as possible, the interests of the Church and State on questions pending with the various Govern-

Bismarck, England and the Congress. BERLIN, March 7 .- Bismarck, it is said, is disinclined to attend the conference. His health is again declining, and his physicians recommend his early return to Varsin. It is thought England will decline to invest her representative with the powers implied in the proposal to change the conference to a congress.

Report of the Justice Mine Committee of Investigation That \$1 Deed and \$250,000 to Cook and the Same to Schultz An Alurming Mistory of Fraud, Swindling and Mismanagement. San Francisco, Maich 7 .- Tho

committee on the investigation of the Justice Mining Company, appointed at a special meeting of the stockholders held on the first of December last. have completed an elaborate report. the main points of which have been already made public, the conclusions of the committed being in accordance with a ports previously published as to the a sper in which the deed of Justice give id to the Alta Company was made for \$1 consideration, and the payment of \$250,006 to Cook and reimburse him for money disbursed by him in settling dispute. The committee express the opinion that a conspiracy existed to defraud the Justice stockholders of a valuable portion of the mine, and state that the responsibility of the transaction devolves upon George Schuliz, who received \$250,000 from the Alta managers for his services in their behalf.

the committee to have been engineered by J. W. Parson and Schultz, as heretofore charged. The committee find that the California Mill Company, under the management of Schultz and his confederates, has bled the Justice stockholders to the tune of \$1,250,000; that between September 1st 1876 and June 1st 1877, President Schultz pocketed as his share of the milling swindle \$339,150, and urge that suit be commenced for its recovery. He also realized large profits from outside milling operations on Justice ore. The report also deals with the practices of E. A. Schultz, Superintendent, in the way of raising pay rolls, issuing fictitious vouchers and other devices. A much greater amount of traud is believed to have been covered up by the partial destruction of the cash book at the

The committee also find that the Secretary had kept his books in a confused condition, and there seemed to be some over issue of stock, but this is not definitely ascertained. The committee bave made a demand on Kennedy, the late Secretary, \$154,986 92 in responce to which he has returned in cash, \$3745 65; in vouchers, \$45,875 25. Annexed to the committee's report is a detailed statement of the finances of the Justice Company. The total receipts tor May 1, 1876 to December 1, 1877 were \$5,436,474; disbursements, \$5,-355,534; liabilities on the 1st of December, \$560,152, the principal items being an overdraft at the Bank of California of \$337,563; bills payable, \$55.883; due the Union Mill Company, \$87,423; Carson and Tahoe Lumber and Flume Company, \$16,698; emploves, \$18,440; Giant Powder Company, \$13,451. The receipts of the Company from December 1st, 1877 to March 1st, 1878, including the balance on hand were \$549,187; expenditures during the same time, \$501,701. The report concludes with an encouraging account of the present condition and prospects of the Company.
